- Recycles used/surplus household and construction materials donated by individuals, retail/whole-sale stores, construction sites, and solid waste management providers
- Sorts, stores, and sells donated supplies to the general public at greatly reduced prices
- All profits from ReStore sales go to funding the mission of Habitat
- Products are 50% less than market value
- Every year, Illinois landfills accumulate over 15 million tons of waste
- One ReStore is capable of collecting, selling, and respectively diverting between 30 and 220 tons of material from landfills per year
- Every donation is tax deductible
- Located at 869 S. Rohlwing Road in Addison (just north of North Ave. on Rohlwing/Rt. 53)
- Store hours: Thursday-Friday: 9am-5pm Saturday: 10am-6pm
- ReStore accepts (but is not limited to) the following items: appliances, cabinets, countertops, doors, electrical supplies, plumbing, lumber (6' or longer), hardware, tools, lighting, wooden furniture
- Volunteer opportunities include: picking up products, inspecting and preparing donations, merchandising products, customer service, office support, special events
- ReStore donations can be dropped off during store hours or a pick-up maybe arranged with ReStore Manager, Jim Fessler

- DuPage Habitat for Humanity (DHFH) is a locally run affiliate of Habitat for Humanity International (HFHI)[®], a nonprofit, ecumenical Christian housing organization
- DHFH was founded in 1995 as a registered 501(c)3 non-profit organization
- Works in partnership with families and volunteer labor to build affordable housing in DuPage County at no profit to Habitat
- Since 1995, DHFH has partnered with the community to build and sell homes to over 50 families
- Homes are sold to families on the basis of need, ability to re-pay a 30-year mortgage, and a willingness to invest 250 hours of 'sweat equity' labor in DHFH's mission
- No interest is charged on the 30-year mortgage
- DHFH also participates in HFHI's "House for a House" program, tithing the funds to build a home in the Dominican Republic for every home built locally
- DHFH is governed by a local volunteer board of directors
- Today, HFHI is the 6th largest homebuilder in the U.S.
- DHFH must raise about \$200,000 per home built and acquire donations of new products and services to keep development costs as low as possible
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
